Enamel Erosion The Erosive Effect of Various Beverages on Human Teeth

Challenge: Health

Abstract: Acidic solutions have been shown to be harmful to human teeth. The purpose of this study was to illustrate this effect using real-life examples. Eighteen human teeth were exposed to six common beverages of different acidities for four or eight weeks. The difference in their pre- and post-exposure weights was used to determine tooth structure loss. Both exposure time and beverage acidity influenced final results.
